Nuclear energy breakthrough

Czechoslovakian scientists have made a breakthrough in nuclear technology. Since its erection after the Czechoslovakian revolution, the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia has made it its goal to revolutionize the nuclear industry. Finally, after decades of research and experiments, we are one step closer to a cleaner, more durable way of harnessing nuclear energy.

Czechoslovakia has always been a world leader in nuclear energy and nuclear science. About 25% of our population is employed in the nuclear industry. Scientists from all over the world are encouraged to apply for a working visa in Czechoslovakia to help build on the future. The enzyme lactase targets lactose and effectively transforms it into two separate sugars that can then be absorbed into the body as fuel. The new element, called Czechtase, works in the same manner. It breaks down nuclear waste into three different substances that can each be disposed of in different ways. The three substances appear in clean layers after the transformation process, making it easy to divide the waste and send it off for processing. Recycling is not possible, due to the nature of the substances. But the substances can be safely disposed of.

The breakthrough was made possible after Dr Marie Yousef joined the program four years ago. Marie Yousef is a scientist specialized in hazardous elements. Her knowledge of the field allowed for a new insight on how to find a way to dispose of nuclear waste. The Czechoslovakian Organisation for Nuclear Innovation has declared a celebration is in order to honour Dr Marie Yousef and the team of researchers. The entire scientific society of Czechoslovakia is invited. The Supreme Leader herself will be joining the celebration as well, accompanied by her two most trusted advisors, Eline Tanghe and Pauline De Baets. The celebration is expected to be hosted

in April. A research paper is expected to be released to the public by the end of March. The technology will be shared with the rest of the world upon request. Our Supreme Leader has officially decreed that should the countries responsible for the false accusations request the new technology, they must first come forth with a public apology for wrongfully accusing us.

This achievement is another example of the superiority of Czechovalia. We are trailblazers for the world, whether it is cultural, political or scientific. For over nine years, children have been taught at school about ethics and the consequences of committing crime. It is thanks to these measures that crime rates are at an all-time low.

Czechoslovakia is one of the safest places on earth, which is quite unbelievable because it's also one of the biggest countries there are. How is this possible, you ask yourself? We spoke with policewoman Ms. Petra Durbrovi.

"Thanks to the increased security on the streets and in public places, safety is assured. People feel safe when there are policewomen around. About nine years ago, we started a project to make Czechoslovakia safer. We hired more people, we educated children more about the consequences and we trained policewomen to go undercover. Nowadays, we see the results. When people go to public places, they don't always see policewomen. That's because the people know that there are undercover policewomen. That way, people don't feel intimidated and they can carry on with a safe feeling."

This weekend, it's been ten years ago that there was a big robbery in Bardan.

"The citizens of Bardan are really happy. They laugh more and they're braver than ever before. We believe that this is all because of our strict approach nine years ago. We have to admit that the project is very strict, and many people had to adjust enormously. But now, nine years after its introduction, it has become normal. People no longer have any problems with it, and there are no more protests against the entanglement of various things. Everyone has resigned themselves to it and continues their life.

If we look at the figures from the surveys conducted by the Czechopolic a few months ago, 93% of the inhabitants are happy with the project and they would absolutely not want to return to Bardan ten years ago. The remaining 7% say they don't know what they think is better, but nobody says they are absolutely against it. We call that a success."

The children also get educated about ethics and the consequences of committing crimes. They learn what happens to someone if they commit a crime, and they even visit a prison where they talk to the inmates. This method has proved to be very efficient, as the inmates where they talk to, are all chosen on the basis of good behavior. They learn a lot on the school trip. It's something that the children look forward to since they are little, and they remember it for the rest of their lives.

Everyone who is older than 27 years old, has never had the education about safety on school. How did they get educated? Ms. Petra Durbrovi gives us the answer: "the government has imposed that every company must give training to its employees. There were free and public lectures, there were open-prison days where citizens could hear inmates talk about it. There were commercials, posters, books, clothes, almost everything you can imagine. It took a few

months for the citizens to adjust, but now, everybody is familiar with the state of affairs here in Bardan, it's normal. We don't know Bardan in any other way than it now is, safe."
